OVERCOMING EARLY LIFE CHALLENGES

Matthew's life has been marked by significant health issues. "I have died three times, I have brain damage, I have involuntary movements, and I am deaf," he said. These disabilities might seem overwhelming to many, but Matthew has never let them hold him back. Instead, he uses his experiences to inspire others, reminding them that despite obstacles, strength and determination can lead to success.

Lynn Shattuck, Director of Disability Support Services, has admireď Matthew.

"I've met many students over the course of my career here at RVC. but Matthew stands out. He has had more hurdles to overcome than the average student, yet he has a drive and determination that is truly admirable. In a world where it is so easy to feel entitled and find excuses for why things don't go as planned, Matthew never complains or feels sorry for himself. He just keeps moving forward."

THE POWER OF **POSITIVITY & RESPECT**

During his first week at RVC, Matthew made a friend in his Art History class – Olivia. Her acceptance and friendship made a profound impact on Matthew.

"She treated me like a regular college student," he recalled.

The kindness and support he received from Olivia, along with other classmates and faculty, helped Matthew feel less like a lone wolf and more like a part of a community. From holding doors open to helping fill water bottles, the community at RVC showed Matthew that he wasn't alone.

"The bottomless compassion paved the way for the community that is so welcoming to be a part of," Matthew said.

THE 12-YEAR JOURNEY TO BUILDING A LEGACY

Matthew's academic journey was not straightforward. Before RVC, he attended two other colleges, faced employment rejections, and battled depression.

Despite this, he decided it was finally time to finish his education.

While he initially faced numerous challenges getting started at RVC, he never gave up. He found a support system in Disability Support Services and formed a small study group to help him pass his classes.

"There were a few moments where my thoughts weren't aligned with the professors, but once they understood that I get the same results using different methods, they let me do my thing," Matthew explained.

Tracy Hazen, Assistant Professor, Communications & Humanities, was impressed with Matthew's dedication to assignments and eagerness to take on challenges. It was an enriching experience to have Matt in her class. He consistently displayed a remarkable eagerness to learn, demonstrating a deep commitment to his education and personal growth.

"What truly stood out was his choice of challenging topics for assignments, showcasing a deep curiosity and a willingness to tackle complex issues head-on. Additionally, the time and effort he put into perfecting his work was exemplary," shared Tracy.

"Matt wasn't iust about getting things done; he wanted them to be the best they could be. That kind of dedication is rare and truly admirable."

Matthew's story is not just about overcoming obstacles; it's about building a legacy.

He spent twelve years working towards his goal of graduating, and his perseverance paid off.

"My legacy and yours are in our hands when we firmly grasp our degrees," Matthew explained.

LOOKING AHEAD: AN IMPACT IN FILM

"Being an advocate for yourself is one of the most challenging skills that all students face," shared Cara Vande Voorde, Accommodations Specialist.

"Matt is doing this on a daily basis at RVC, in the community, and in his home environment. At RVC, this means letting staff know what barriers are in his way, like accessibility issues with academic content or communication concerns. Matt is asking each of us at RVC to look outside the box and come up with creative solutions. He is breaking norms and fighting for the life he wants to lead."

This fall, he plans to return to RVC for the Mass Communication certification program before transferring to Northern Illinois University to major in film. His ultimate goal is to work in the film industry, using his experiences and knowledge to make a meaningful impact.

As Matthew reflects on his time at RVC, he expresses deep gratitude for the community that supported him. "Compared to the other two colleges, the support system here (Professors, faculty, and even students!) has been so kind and open," shared Matthew. "I felt I could do anything here!"

Matthew's journey is a powerful reminder that with hard work and determination, anything is possible.

RAISE PROGRAM RECEIVES \$14,630 GRANT

On behalf of Rock Valley College, the Rock Valley College Foundation received a \$14,630 grant for the Raising Aspirations through an Inclusive Student Experience (RAISE) program. Awarded through the Ralph A. and Mildred Johnson Fund of the Community Foundation of Northern Illinois, it allowed for the recent purchase of curriculum upgrades aimed at further empowering students with intellectual disabilities.

RUNNING START TO SUCCESS MARGARET TORIO

Margaret Torio's journey at RVC began through Running Start.

This program allows select, academically-motivated students at participating high schools the opportunity to earn their high school diploma and associate's degree concurrently by attending RVC full-time during their junior and senior years.

Despite not knowing what to expect, Margaret described her experience at RVC as life-changing.

As an immigrant, it was initially a struggle for Margaret to adapt to her new environment, including language barriers, cultural differences, and other obstacles.

When she was in high school, meeting people with the same interests as hers was a challenge, making it hard to make friends.

"When I arrived at RVC, the community was so diverse that any of your interests could be filled by student organizations. Clubs that I got involved in made me feel so welcome that I treat them as my second family, and it is also where I have met lifelong friends."

At RVC, Margaret grew personally and professionally. She took on leadership roles, including President of the Running Start Club, President of the Campus Activities Board (CAB), Homecoming Queen 2023, and a leading Brand Ambassador – all of which contributed to her future career and goals.

"Margaret showed remarkable dedication to her studies, social media branding, and helping others flourish. She consistently demonstrated an exceptional work ethic, a strong sense of responsibility, and a keen ability to lead by example," said Sheila Ogbevire, Student Activities Coordinator.

Margaret's experience at RVC was transformative. She appreciated the professors who make connecting and understanding course materials easy.

"The faculty are the best; they make the campus lively and filled with events every month. I love that they consider the students' well-being and find ways to make us enjoy our time at RVC," shared Margaret.

Challenges are a part of every educational journey, and for Margaret, it was adjusting her standards and expectations from high school to college. In college, she learned the value of putting in extra effort to succeed.

Her advice to fellow students is to get involved, be present, and be open-minded. "Margaret exemplifies what it means to be a member of the RVC community. Whether through her unwavering work ethic, deep commitment to academic excellence, or active involvement in extracurricular activities, Margaret consistently demonstrates exceptional dedication," said Taylor Honeyman, D100 Early College Coordinator and Transition Advisor. "Margaret's drive and determination set a remarkable example for her peers, showcasing the true spirit of being a Golden Eagle."

Margaret will transfer to a four-year university in the fall to pursue a bachelor's degree.

ROCK VALLEY COLLEGE



Kervin Thomas faced many challenges on his journey to the United States from Grenada. Upon his arrival, he faced a daunting obstacle: his school records were lost to fire and hurricanes, leaving him unable to prove his high school graduation.

FINDING GUIDANCE

Soon, he connected with retired instructor Pat Young who encouraged him to get his GED here at RVC.

Kervin was initially concerned with the cost as other GED programs proved to be very expensive. The registration window was already closed, but Pat figured out a way to get him in the program.

PURSUING A PASSION

After achieving his GED, Kervin opted to pursue a media production certificate at RVC, driven by his interest in audio and video production, as well as photography. This drive led him to establish his own small business.

"I have a podcast production company, a media production company, a small one," Kervin explained. "I collaborate with organizations in the Rockford area, assisting them in starting podcasts and other media ventures. I provide equipment and set up the acoustics for their rooms, all thanks to the skills acquired through my media production certificate. Working alongside instructors such as Dr. Steven Taddei and Kyle Owens for video has been invaluable."

Dr. Taddei reflected on Kervin's time in the Mass Communication Department. "Kervin is one of those unique individuals who is both selflessly kind and highly talented. He was an insightful student, always willing to learn, and he continues to impress with his personal and professional growth."

Looking ahead, Kervin is determined to continue his education, aiming for both an undergraduate degree and a master's degree. With RVC's affordability and extensive scholarship opportunities, he feels confident in pursuing his dreams without the burden of debt.

"RVC has helped in major ways. Firstly, the [RVC Foundation] scholarships offered allowed me to take classes with no worries. Secondly, the hybrid classes allowed me to still work full time and complete my degree." – Kervin Thomas



EXPLORING NEW INTERESTS

Kervin also found a passion in Acoustic Ecology, a field that combined his love for nature and audio production. Classes like Plants and Society and Audio Production fueled his curiosity, while his instructors encouraged his growth.

Kervin completed an independent research project with Dr. Megan Pease, examining the impact of burning on invasive plants like Queen Anne's Lace. This hands-on experience deepened his understanding and ignited his enthusiasm for environmental science.

"Kervin has an intense curiosity and compelling way to explain things to people. Anyone who has had the pleasure of working with him knows his sense of humor keeps the dull moments lively," said Dr. Pease. "He's a natural leader and teacher. As he takes his next steps away from RVC, I know he'll be successful."

Kervin is grateful for the impact RVC has had on his life. He looks forward to making a positive impact on the world, fueled by the education and support he received at Rock Valley College.

RVC transitioned to the NJCAA DII level and holds several regional and national championships; allowing for athletic scholarships.


1967 - STARLIGHT ARRIVES

Despite facing numerous challenges, including dropping out of high school and losing her sight at a young age, Tijuana Glass never gave up on her dream of earning her GED.

In 2004, amidst personal trials, Tijuana welcomed her son Agustus into the world, adding another layer of responsibility to her plate. Three years later, she faced yet another setback with a cancer diagnosis. Times were challenging, but thankfully she has been completely healed of cancer.

Eventually, Tijuana made the decision to complete her high school diploma. "In November of 2016, though incredibly nervous, I made a call to Rock Valley College Disability Support Services to inquire about GED classes," said Tijuana. "I decided to finally go for it, and I started classes soon after."

Tijuana found invaluable support and resources at RVC to aid her in her journey. With tools like the JAWS computer screen reader and a talking calculator, she embarked on her educational path with renewed hope.

"It took the 'village' of Adult Education and RVC to make Tijuana's dream happen,' shared Linda Scherbarth, Adult Education & Literacy Instructor, "as Tijuana was the first blind student to pursue a GED program at RVC.

DUAL-SPORT GOLDEN EAGLE **SAM TOURTILLOTT**

Sam Tourtillott chose Rock Valley College for its welcoming atmosphere and the opportunity to excel in basketball and softball.

Initially recruited by Coach Darryl Watkins for women's basketball, she was later given the chance to

play both sports by Darin Monroe, Athletic Director & Head Coach.

Her sophomore year was particularly memorable as she competed in nationals for both sports. For basketball, the team entered as the undefeated #3 seed. expected to dominate. For softball, they were the #13 seed; underdogs who managed to pull off significant upsets. These experiences, shared with teammates who had amazing chemistry, are ones she cherishes.

Coach Monroe acknowledged that being a college athlete in one sport is tough and for two years Sam made the commitment to being a part of two nationally-recognized programs in basketball and softball at RVC.

"She was able to participate in 3 NJCAA National Tournaments while being a member of these sports. Sam flourished on the softball field and capped it off with our first Top 10 finish at the NJCAA D2 National Tournament in May, while also being recognized as our 1st ever NJCAA D2 All-American," shared Coach Monroe.

However, Sam's journey has not been without its obstacles.

Last fall, she suffered a severe injury while playing softball, breaking her collarbone in three places, and sustaining a concussion. Her recovery process involved surgery and eight weeks of rest, during which she was eager to return.

Even while sidelined, she learned valuable lessons about the game, gaining a new perspective by watching and adapting. "It was definitely a challenge," she shared, "but I learned a lot more sitting on the sidelines than I have playing."

Coach Watkins is proud of Sam's continued commitment and dedication as a student-athlete.

"Sam made a choice when she committed to Rock Valley - a choice to commit to excellence. Being a dual-sport athlete isn't just about trying to master sets of skills in completely different sports, but it's about the relentless pursuit of perfection," explained Coach Watkins. 

STUDENTS SHINE IN NATIONAL CYBER LEAGUE COMPETITION

This year, RVC Computer and Information Systems students competed in the National Cyber League (NCL) Competition.

The NCL, powered by Cyber Skyline, is a virtual, learning-centered cybersecurity competition designed to bridge the gap from curriculum to careers. This competition is held once each semester and is open to college and high school students.

"In the realm of cybersecurity, success is not just about technical prowess, but also about adaptability, critical thinking, and a relentless pursuit of excellence. Our students' remarkable achievements in the National Cyber League Competition reflect their dedication, resilience, and passion for this field," shared Stephanie Wascher. "I am incredibly proud of their accomplishments and confident in their ability to thrive in the ever-evolving landscape of cybersecurity."

Students had to identify hackers from forensic data, pen test and audit vulnerable websites, recover from ransomware attacks, and more. Schools are ranked based on their top team performance, their top student's individual performance, and the aggregate individual performance of their students.

The NCL competition uses a system called badging to help individuals and teams track their performance. The Medal Badges issued by NCL consist of a division and a tier, which together represents an individual or team's percentile score in a game. There are five divisions: Bronze, Silver, Gold, Platinum, and Diamond. Within each division are four tiers. They are represented as a numeric value starting from 4 (being the lowest) to 1 (being the highest).

RVC students placed throughout the top four divisions: Corey Hirsch earned a DIAMOND-1 Medal, Robert Samoraj earned a PLATINUM-1 Medal, Kristina Krist earned a PLATINUM-3 Medal, Jaereth Anderson earned a GOLD-2 Medal, Jailah Campbell earned a SILVER-1 Medal, and Eric Patterson earned a SILVER-1 Medal.

The six were joined by an additional student, **Dylan Gerig-Carlson**, and competed in the team competition, finishing 96th out of 4,199 Teams.

Overall, RVC ranked 49th Nationally out of 476 Colleges and Universities and 15th in the Central United States in the Cyber Power Rankings. Congratulations to our CIS team!


